Summary of results from Motueka 2030 SWOT interviews

The number of people interviewed was 38. Most interviews lasted between 30 and 45 minutes.

Overall impression: Some people had broad interests, others had specific areas of interest or concern (eg, business or environmental, youth or tourism). Some provided more than 10 or even 15 comments in each area, others just one or two (or even none). Interviewers generally tried to avoid any prompting, although when a subject went blank it helped to make a couple of suggestions to get them going. Apart from this, subjects began the sessions with a "blank mind", although most had done their questionnaires first so they should have been ready.

Strengths:

The question asked was "What do you consider to be the area's main present advantages or attributes that will ensure it has a bright, secure future?"

The highest scoring strengths (that is, those mentioned most often) were related to our location and natural environment:

Excellent climate, sunshine - attracts people and businesses	(26 people)

It may be worth noting that few people saw our built facilities and services as strengths. Mentioned only once or twice were the library, Memorial Hall, other public halls, the aerodrome, Council service centre, fire brigade, hospital, St Johns ambulance, museum, community gardens, sports grounds, Decks Reserve, Thorps Bush, Te Awhina Marae, the mountain bike park, Community House, golf course, library, churches, skate park and the cycle trail. Weaknesses:

The question asked was: "Are there things about this area that worry you - things that are poorly developed or poorly planned?"

Fewer comments were listed in this area, reflecting (we would like to think) that interviewees were more positive than negative in their feelings about Motueka.

The three highest areas of concern were:
